Unlike machine work, every Chamba Rumal demands time and heart; one wrong stitch can disrupt the entire balance. Yet, he continues with steady hands, guided by faith and tradition.

Today, Ramesh teaches young artisans, determined to keep the craft alive. When he finishes a Rumal depicting Krishna and Radha, he smiles quietly, knowing that his art, born from the mountains and his soul, will travel far, carrying the timeless spirit of Chamba.







From Thread to Art — The Embroidery Journey



Design & Transfer: The process starts with sketching and transferring patterns—floral, geometric, or traditional—onto fabric using tracing tools or chalk.

Fabric & Thread Choice: Artisans pick the perfect fabric and thread based on color, texture, and quality.

Framing: The fabric is stretched in a hoop or frame for smooth, even stitching.

Stitching & Decoration: Using stitches like chain or satin, artisans bring designs to life, often adding beads, sequins, or mirrors for extra charm.

Finishing Touch: The piece is cleaned, pressed, and stored carefully to preserve its artistry.















India has over 30 distinct embroidery traditions.

Do you know?

Most Indian embroidery is done entirely by hand, often taking weeks or months to complete a single piece.

Many embroidery patterns carry cultural or spiritual meanings. Motifs of peacocks, lotuses, and paisleys symbolize prosperity and beauty.

Embroidery in India often uses natural fabrics and threads, blending artistry with eco-friendly practices.



GI Cherieshed Embroideries



Many Embroideries crafts are recognised by GI Tag for their rich history and origin.

- Lucknow Chikan Craft Originating from Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh, this art reflects grace, precision, and centuries-old Mughal influence.
- Phulkari Phulkari, meaning "flower work," is a vibrant embroidery tradition from Punjab known for its colorful geometric floral patterns.
- Sujini Embroidery Work of Bihar— Sujini embroidery from Bihar transforms plain fabric into storytelling canvases through intricate running stitches.
- Chamba Rumal The Chamba Rumal of Himachal Pradesh is a hand-embroidered masterpiece depicting mythological scenes in double satin stitch.


